

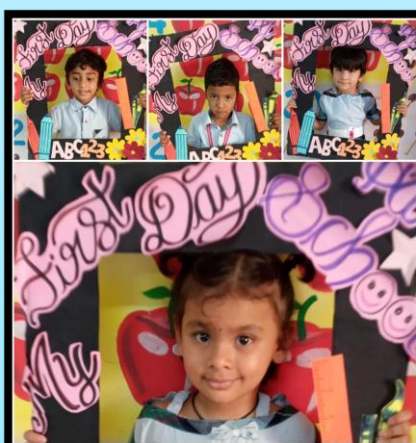

KINESTHETIC LEARNING- CHILDREN LEARN AS THEY PLAY

Fine motor skills refer to the coordinated movements involving the small muscles of the hands and wrists. These skills are essential for tasks such as throwing a ball, drawing strokes and patterns, tracing letters, and sorting various shapes.

At our school, Pre-Primary students engaged in an exciting activity called Colour Ball Toss – a vibrant outdoor game where children enthusiastically aimed and threw colorful balls into baskets that matched each colour. This playful exercise not only boosted hand-eye coordination but also reinforced colour recognition and precision.

Students also participated in a variety of pencil control activities, which included tracing and drawing strokes, patterns, shapes, and letters, both on paper and in sand. These hands-on experiences were further enriched by toy-based learning, where children sorted objects of different shapes while singing related rhymes. This multisensory approach enhanced their understanding of forms while making the process joyful and memorable.

Developing fine motor skills at this stage is crucial, as it supports cognitive development, strengthens the nervous system, and lays the foundation for future academic tasks such as writing and problem-solving.
